Crispin Hill, Headmaster of Aldro from 1952-84 very sadly died last week. His funeral will be at St Mary's Shackleford on Friday February 1st at 2:00pm and the Aldro Chapel Choir will be singing. Crispin's father had been headmaster before him and he had been a boy at Aldro when the school was in Eastbourne. His Christian faith was central to his life and to the school that he was so successful in developing during his 32 years as head. The fact that so many old boys speak of how happy they were at Aldro – at a time when this was not necessarily the norm in prep schools – speaks volumes for the way he ran Aldro. He continued to take a lively interest in the school throughout his retirement. A fuller tribute to him will in due course appear in "The Aldronian".

Fossil trip to the Isle of Sheppey



During the Christmas holiday we organised a trip to the north shore of the Isle of Sheppey. This area is famous for its wide variety of Eocene fossils which were deposited on the sea floor about 45 million years ago. The climate was warmer in those days with palm trees and mangrove swamps on the nearby shores. There were turtles, fish and sharks swimming in the shallow sea and crabs, lobsters and a multitude of different snails living on the land. These animals and plants all left their remains to be fossilised and they can be found on the beach today.

We chose a dry day but the temperature was freezing and it was soon evident that we were not going to last too long. We managed to find a small selection of fossils before the cold took over and we returned to the mini bus to warm up. James Vance had the find of the day which was a large shark's tooth. Gabriel Byrne did well to spot a fossilised seed in the shingle and there were plenty of small pyritised gastropods and lots of fossilised wood all with worm tubes. We also found several examples of lobster burrows which are trace fossils.

On the way back we stopped for a meal and Mr. Gardiner gave out prizes to the finders of the best fossils. Despite the cold we had all enjoyed our day out and the boys went home with a few items for their collections.
